## 'Miracle' Survivors Return to Palisades

Passengers sponsor luncheon to honor Hudson County emergency responders

When U.S. Airways Flight 1549 plunged into the Hudson River on January 15, passengers Dave Sanderson and Barry Leonard did not think they would make it out of the frigid waters alive. But all 155 passengers and crew aboard survived in what was quickly dubbed the 'Miracle on the Hudson.'


"A tragedy could have happened on January 15, but instead a miracle occurred," said Sanderson. "That miracle would never have happened without the (New York Waterway) ferry boats and the other first responders that were there that day."

While Capt. Chesley "Sully" Sullenberger gained worldwide acclaim for skillfully landing the plane into the river, Sanderson and Leonard wanted to recognize and thank the first responders in North Hudson County who were often overlooked following their heroic rescue efforts. On July 28, Sanderson and Leonard organized and sponsored a thank you luncheon to give special thanks to those first responders. The luncheon was held on Palisades Medical Center's outdoor patio, which is located approximately one mile north of where Flight 1549 made its water landing.

Sanderson and Leonard enjoyed a heartfelt reunion with Palisades' nurses and doctors, and




Palisades' Emergency Department staff stand proudly with Miracle on the Hudson passengers Dave Sanderson and Barry Leonard.

## Palisades' Emergency Department **Gets High-Tech Makeover**

### New Automated System Improves Patient Safety and Care

A new electronic system is helping to automate clinical documentation practices in the Emergency Department at Palisades Medical Center.

Picis' Integrated Clinical and Financial IT System reduces the amount of manual documentation by automating data collection from a wide variety of medical devices and integrating this data with online patient flow sheets. As a result, physicians and nurses have more time to spend with patients.

The new system improves patient safety by providing caregivers with on-the-spot access to the latest information and to hospital care protocols and best practices. Data sharing also ensures that clinicians have all the information they need to provide quality care at all times.

Studies show that hospitals and health systems utilizing these approaches demonstrate a positive impact on both quality and financial performance of the entire healthcare organization. An average hospital can lose \$30 or more per patient in the E.D. from incomplete or inaccurate documentation, coding and charging for patient care provided.

#### The Record, 9/1/2009 **Emergency Rooms Feel Clock Ticking**

The waiting room in the emergency department at Palisades Medical Center has a magnificent view of the Manhattan skyline. But patients better look fast: The hospital says its ER wait time is down to nine

Walk-in patients used to wait an hour or more before they were examined by a nurse at the North Bergen hospital's ER. Then they waited again to see a doctor. But that was before Palisades reorganized the front end of its emergency department into a rapid evaluation unit. Now, a team of two nurses, a technician and a physician move two or three patients at a time through fasttrack triage and treatment.

...Ivett Sierra walked into Palisades on a recent morning at 8:57. She registered at 9:02 a.m. and was seen by a nurse and a doctor at 9:08. A year ago, she had to wait at least an hour. "This time, it was quick," she said.

#### The Hudson Reporter, 9/20/2009 **Palisades Updates ER**

Palisades Medical Center updated its emergency room this summer and continues to fine-tune the process in order to address the medical dilemma of wait times. Its emergency room now uses a Rapid Evaluation Unit (REU), where patients are asked questions and given a medical exam by two nurses: a technician and a physician. They often treat two to three patients within around nine minutes of them entering the hospital.

The REU was built onto the Emergency Room this year. It now features digital radiology, a new Picis computer system which allows for rapid delivery of a patient's history, a Vital Works computer system that gives staff up-to the-minute updates of those in their care, an expansion of patient treatment areas with new cardiac, stroke, and ventilation equipment, and a renovation of patient waiting rooms and staff facilities.

The New Jersey Department of Health is responsible to ensure the facility is compliant with mandatory federal and state regulations. After a thorough evaluation of the facility, resident care practices are reviewed and observed. Residents, families and staff are interviewed to determine their satisfaction with care at the Harborage. Each year, the Department conducts approximately 400 full, onsite licensure inspections with only a small percentage receiving a deficiency free survey.

### **Keeping Kids Focused on Eating Healthy**



During the last 30 years, the number of children who are overweight has more than doubled among 2- to 5-year-olds and more than tripled among 6- to 11-year-olds. This increase has major health consequences and has broadened the focus of dietary guidance to address children's over consumption of energy-dense, nutrient-poor foods and beverages and physical activity patterns.

Palisades Medical Center's Registered Dieticians work throughout the year with children and their families to help reinforce lifelong eating habits that help children grow up healthy to reach their full potential and live healthy lives. The Palisades team provides individualized assessments and offers counseling on weight management, cholesterol and other important health issues.

Children (ages 2-11 years) should achieve optimal physical and cognitive development, attain a healthy weight, enjoy food, and reduce the risk of chronic disease through appropriate eating habits and participation in regular physical activity. ## **Speech Therapy Department Undergoes Expansion**

Since 2002, Palisades Medical Center has seen a dramatic increase in patients requiring speech therapy services. Patient visits have jumped from 30 per month in 2003 to the current rate of more than 300 per month. Over the same time period, Palisades' team of speech therapists has also grown from one to six to meet this increase in demand for services.

A key reason for this growth is Palisades work with local schools and other area hospitals to help treat children with Autism and speech delay issues. By working with other community entities, Palisades is helping to ensure that comprehensive services are available for children with special needs by offering a full range of diagnostic and therapeutic services for speech, language, swallowing and voice disorders.

Palisades' speech therapists also work with adult patients whose abilities are impaired because of a stroke or head injury, those who suffer from speech impairments such as stuttering, patients who have suffered a hearing



loss and those with a mental disability or a condition such as cerebral palsy.

For patients who have swallowing problems, Palisades' speech therapists perform a barium swallow study to diagnose the cause of the problem and provide treatment. Recently, an adult patient was unable to eat following a stroke. After working with a speech therapist and adding Vital Stim (Electronic Stimulation) to the swallowing muscles, the patient is now able to enjoy full meals throughout the day.

### Palisades Earns AHA/ASA Award for High Quality Cardiac Care



The American Heart Association (AHA) and the American Stroke Association (ASA) have recognized Palisades Medical Center for providing the best possible care to cardiac and stroke patients.

Palisades was featured in the "America's Best Hospitals" issue of *U.S. News & World Report* to commemorate its receipt of the AHA/ASA's *Get With The Guidelines* Performance Achievement Award. The awards are given for achievement in consistently caring for cardiac and stroke patients using the most up-to-date guidelines and recommendations.

Get With The Guidelines gives

healthcare professionals the tools and reports they need to effectively treat coronary heart disease, heart failure and stroke patients. Providers who use *Get With The Guidelines* are armed with the latest evidence-based guidelines and immediate access to clinical decision support to ultimately improve the quality of life and help reduce deaths among heart and stroke patients. Hospitals are recognized in each category in which they achieve at least 85 percent compliance to *Get With The Guidelines* measures. Currently more than 1,450 hospitals participate in the program.

The AHA/ASA recognition comes just a few months after Palisades became one of only two hospitals in the entire state to receive a Perfect 100 Score' in treating heart attack patients by New Jersey's Department of Health & Senior Services. The PMC Foundation also recently obtained grant support from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation to participate in a statewide initiative that is reducing racial and ethnic health disparities for African American and Latino patients with heart failure.

### **Dr. Nils Bergman Speaks to Moms About KMC**

On September 23, nearly 100 local residents were treated to special presentation by Dr. Nils Bergman, a South-African trained pediatrician whose Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC) offers a revolutionary way for mother's to care for their newborns, particularly those born prematurely.

KMC is a way of holding a preterm or full term infant so that there is skinto-skin contact between the infant and the person holding it. The baby, wearing only a diaper, is held against the parent's bare chest. KMC for preterm infants is typically practiced for two to three hours per day over an extended time period in

early infancy. With babies who are medically stable, there is no maximum duration for KMC.

According to Dr. Bergman, separating babies from their mothers mitigates against breastfeeding success and has a broader detrimental affect on the infant's neurological development. Researchers have found that the close physical contact with the parent can help to stabilize the preterm infant's heartbeat, temperature, and breathing. Researchers also have found that mothers who use KMC often have more success with breastfeeding and improve their milk supply.

## Seton Hall University Grant Supports Stroke Patients

Palisades Medical Center was one of four New Jersey hospitals to receive a \$15,000 grant from Seton Hall University's Education and Research Partnership Program for the development of a Post-Rehabilitation Stroke Support Group.

In the United States, more than 700,000 people suffer a stroke each year, and approximately two-thirds of these individuals survive and require rehabilitation. The goals of rehabilitation are to help survivors become as independent as possible and to attain the best possible quality of life. But during and after rehabilitation, stroke survivors may face emotional challenges as they struggle with daily physical tasks and their ability to communicate.

Palisades' Post-Rehabilitation Stroke Support Group is designed to address the difficulties experienced by stroke or neurological/brain injury patients who have completed a course of treatment. The support group meets weekly and participants discuss their experiences and share tips on solving challenges.

"I'm really bonded to Palisades Medical Center and the first responders," said Sanderson, who suffered severe hypothermia when he stood in the frigid water helping passengers transfer from the plane to a raft. "You don't realize how lucky you are to have people take care of you like this."

Choking back tears during the luncheon, Leonard expressed his gratitude to Palisades' staff and the first responders. He gave special thanks to Hilda R. Roque-Dieguez, MD, who treated him for a fractured septum sustained during the crash landing. "Hilda was amazing," said Leonard. "She was the one in the triage who looked after me. She was my angel."

Sanderson and Leonard met when they were both taken to Palisades' Emergency Room. When they began to speak to each other, they realized that they only live a mile away from one another in Charlotte, N.C. The two men have developed a strong friendship since then, and both continue to fly regularly for business trips. In fact, Leonard continues to fly the same U.S. Airways flight every week to commute toand-from his job in Manhattan.

"They (the first responders) are the people who helped us the most that day to get us back to where we are. We just wanted to do something to say thank you," said Sanderson.








Last minute details are being finalizedto make this year's Star Stream Ball a truly memorable Halloween Night.
